Did you know?

Isolation is a silent killer of older adults, affecting over 8 million seniors in the United States. Julianne Holt-Ustad, Ph.D. (psychology professor at Brigham Young University) notes that lack of social interaction is as bad or worse for seniors' health than smoking or obesity.




Because of the generosity of our community through the county millage, the Home Delivered Meals Program (Meals on Wheels) would be prioritized to continue regardless of federal funding cuts.

Our 2025 Financial Snapshot



Why do we need your help? Did you know that:

- Benzie Senior Resources is the grateful recipient of a county millage, which covers approximately 60% of our expenses.
- Benzie Senior Resources is a registered 501 c 3 non-profit organization which must fundraise to meet the non-millage-covered needs of our growing senior population in Benzie County. Each year this amounts to between \$600,000 and \$700,000.
- The need for senior assistance continues to grow. By 2030, over 40% of Benzie County will be over age 60, and that growth trend shows no signs of slowing.

Nutrition By The Numbers



With nutritious food being the building block to health (and therefore independence), food security is our priority program! In 2025, we served **70,000 hot and/or frozen meals** to **270 home-bound individuals** throughout the year. We served **21,000 on-site and carry-out meals** to **1,000 people** at The Gathering Place. Attendance at **Produce Bingo** was over **900**, (where each participant left with over 30 pounds of fresh produce and shelf-stable foods). **145 people** participated in **Project Fresh**, receiving nearly **\$4,000** worth of local fresh produce. This is the equivalent of **95,000 meals made available** to **1,500 individuals**. Whatever funding challenges arise, nutrition will always be at the forefront of our service delivery.

You've requested help...now what?



Home Delivered Meals, Home Healthcare and other home-based services begin with an "Assessment". Registered Nurse Donna shares what happens during an Assessment:

"Once we receive a referral (request for care, which can come from the client themselves, physicians or another interested party), I head out to the client's home. There, I'll learn what I can and use that information

to match available services to the client's needs. After some ice-breaking chit chat I'll ask things such as: Do you have a primary physician? Do you have access to needed medication and can you afford it? Do you know the side effects of your medications? Do you drive? What are your health concerns? Do you need care for incontinence? Can you prepare your own food? Do you need help with bathing? Do you need transportation to doctor appointments, for hair cuts or other things? If appropriate, I'll give some patient education with regard to nutrition. We are there to listen, and any judgments are left at the door. Any one of us could need this help at any time. The whole point of our coming to the home is to learn how we can be of service, and as holistically as possible."

Snow Days and Home Delivered Meals

What happens when the roads are bad and Home Delivered Meals (HDM) can't run? Here is the behind-the-scenes look at the wrap-around that ensures that our most vulnerable resident still receive food: Staff members divide the routes to make personal phone calls to each client making sure they had enough food in the home. The calls happen for each closing, even if the weather event is 2-3 days in a row. If the client is out of food, staff members go deliver in 4-wheel-drive vehicles. When weather reports show incoming storms, the HDM team packages and delivers additional frozen meals on that day's route to tide people over.



We Could Use Your Help!

Speaking of Home Delivered Meals... each year a significant portion of our Home Delivered Meals



volunteer drivers head to warmer climates for the winter. This presents a challenge for meal delivery as the winter is also cold and flu season, with more illnesses. If you stay for the winter, would you consider helping us deliver meals? Benzie Senior Resources has their own fleet of delivery cars (most are 4-wheel drive) so there is no wear and tear on volunteer vehicles (or fuel expense). Most delivery shifts are about 4 hours long (including pickup of food and return of the vehicle), and volunteers say how often they would like to work.
